

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INTRODUCTION

Education is a fundamental human right as stated in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Many young people graduate from elementary to middle school and middle school to high school, and then go on to pursue postsecondary studies without pause. This guide is for all the students who may not have had their picture in a yearbook, or had their graduation picture hung in the walls of their high school. This guide celebrates all the tenacious students who pursue their right to education.

This toolkit was created by **Amadeusz** in partnership with the City of Toronto through the **Toronto Youth Equity Strategy (TYES).** This version was updated as of September of 2025.

As a young person, I found myself focused on trying to support my family and didn't really value high school. It just didn't seem to connect to what I was experiencing at home and in my community. I attended class just enough to keep passing. With two credits left to graduate I got in some trouble and found myself locked up.

I spent a year on the inside. It was a hard time and I did work towards completing some of my high school credits, but I just wasn't focused.

When I was released I knew I needed to get a job to support myself and my family. I decided to apply to college as a mature student. Going back to complete high school just didn't seem worth the time. I knew I was smart enough for college and I just wanted to get on with my life. I graduated and got my college diploma and I now work full-time as a sales representative.

After working for a bit, I started regretting not completing my high school diploma. So, I enrolled in adult school and got my last two credits. I have no regrets about the path I've taken and I'm proud of the steps I've taken to get where I am today.







ONTARIO SECONDARY SCHOOL DIPLOWA (OSSD)

- ⇒ Granted once a student has earned 30 credits
- ⇒ Students must complete 40 hours of voluntary service
- $_{\Rightarrow}$ Students must pass the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test

The Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD) is granted once a student has earned 30 secondary credits, which includes 18 compulsory credits. Students must also provide evidence of 40 hours of volunteer service and pass the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test or take the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course (OLC4O).

A breakdown of the OSSD requirements is available <u>here</u>. However, there are alternate ways to earn the OSSD, which can be found on page 13.

40 volunteer hours are required to graduate. These volunteer hours can include any work that you are not paid to complete. Sometimes, through speaking to a guidance counselor, hours that you have earned but do not have paperwork for can be counted towards your required hours.

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test requires that the student earn a minimum score of 300/400 to pass. The standardized test is written by all students when they are in grade ten. It focuses on reading and writing, and specifically tests that require

the reading of different types of texts including graphic text, informational text, narratives, articles, and essays. Students must also show competency in essay writing, short answer questions, grammar, multiple choice questions, writing a news report, and writing summaries. The OSSLT is written in the spring every year. If a student has missed the testing or does not pass, s/he may write the test again the following year (and again, if they so choose). An alternative method of meeting this requirement includes taking the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Course (OLC4O) which focuses on the same skills but requires a 50% to pass.

Some secondary courses are streamed, in that courses allow students to complete high school credits at varying levels in preparation for different post-secondary options. Note that some courses have been de-streamed, meaning that courses are designed for all learners. This change means that students in certain subjects will take the same course, rather than choosing between Academic and Applied.

Locally Developed (L) / Workplace (E, Grade 11/12)

• Courses focus on practical, real-life applications and skills needed to meet the expectations of employers.





Open (O, Grade 9-12)

• Open to all students, designed to broaden students' knowledge and skills in subject areas that reflect their interests. Not designed with requirements of university, college, or workplace in mind.

Applied (P, Grade 9/10) / College (C, Grade 11/12)





• Courses focus on preparing students for the requirements of college.



Academic (D, Grade 9/10) / University (U, Grade 11/12)

• Courses focus on theory which prepares students for university.

Mixed University/College (M, Grade 11/12)





 Courses equip students with the knowledge and skills to meet entrance requirements for university and college programs.





Advanced Placement (AP)

• Courses offer university-level material to high-school students.

• Internationally recognized and certified two-year pre-university program designed for highly motivated secondary school students.











OSSD SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS

Some secondary schools offer unique programs which allow students to prepare specifically for or take part in apprenticeships, college or university credits while also earning high-school credits. Speak to a Guidance Counselor to find out more.

Program

Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM)

• Students obtain OSSD while focusing on an economic sector, to support them in transitioning to post-secondary. SHSM offers programming for a variety of pathways, such as business and aviation/aerospace.

Preparation For



Dual Credit

 Dual credit programs allow students to take college courses or Level 1 apprenticeship training that counts towards both their OSSD and a post-secondary program.



STEPS to University

• Senior students will work towards achieving a University of Toronto sociology credit and have access to University of Toronto resources while working on secondary school credits.



Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP)

• Students receive industry specific education and training through high school cooperative education. To register, students must be at least 15 years old, with 14 completed credits, and be enrolled as a part or full-time student.



Advanced Credit Experience at York University (ACE)

 Senior students from the Jane and Finch area can earn a first year York University half-credit course and receive a co-op placement on campus, while working on secondary school credits simultaneously. Students have the opportunity to earn up to \$5000 towards a bursary that can be used at York University the upcoming school year, upon acceptance.













OSSD: ALTERNATIVE METHODS

There are alternative methods to obtaining an OSSD, including those below:

Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR)

• PLAR recognizes prior and alternative forms of learning in order to grant students up to 26 credits towards their OSSD, through separate application forms for grade nine and ten courses and grade 11 and 12 courses. For example, having a gym membership can lead to a physical education credit, or having worked in a particular field can be counted as a business credit. In order to gain credits through PLAR, students must be registered with a public school board. Speak to a guidance counselor for more information.

Credit Recovery

• Credit recovery is a program that allows any student who has started a course, but has not passed, to retake parts of the course in order to fulfill the requirements without taking the entire course again. There is no minimum mark that you must have earned previously in order to participate in credit recovery. Course credits must be recovered within two years from the time the student fails the course. A student may work on recovering more than one credit at a time and there is no limit on the number of credits a student may recover. Many schools offer this option. Speak to a guidance counselor for more information.

Section 23 High Schools

• The TDSB Section 23 Programs serve students who are in care, treatment or custody. The program supports youth who require their educational needs to be met outside of the regular school system. Individual education and treatment plans are created for students to address their strengths and needs. Contact your local high school for more information.

Adult High Schools

• Adult high schools offer students over the age of 18 an opportunity to work towards their OSSD in an environment with similar aged students during the day. Adult high schools offer the EdVance program, where students between the ages of 18-20 can earn credits within a couple of months through quad semesters. They also offer adult learning for students over the age of 21, which may also provide night and/or online courses.

E-Learning

• Learning can take place online, based on your own schedule. While most of the course is completed online, there may be an in-person orientation and/or final exam.

OSSD: ALTERNATIVE METHODS

Continuing Education

• Continuing Education through public school boards allows students to complete high school credits on a part-time basis. Most courses offered through day school can also be offered through continuing education. Often, adults are part of continuing education in night school and summer school.

Learning Earning and Parenting (LEAP)

• This program supports parents aged 16 to 25 who are on Ontario Works to complete their high school education, attend parenting classes, and access employment supports. Additional financial supports are provided to participants in this program, including a \$500 bursary for those who complete the program to put towards their own post-secondary education costs or those of their child.

Independent Learning Centre (ILC) Courses

• The Independent Learning Centre (ILC) is the only online high school authorized by the Ontario Ministry of Education to grant credits and the Ontario Secondary School Diploma itself. You can also take individual courses. Each course costs \$40. Often if the ILC is offered through a community organization, the fee for the course is covered by the community organization. If you are over the age of 18 and enrolled in a course through the ILC, you are eligible for free PLAR assessment.

OSSD: ADULT HIGH SCHOOLS

- The TDSB has five adult high schools which offer a variety of credit courses for adults who want to complete their Ontario Secondary School Diploma, prepare for post-secondary education, or gain job-related training.
- ⇒ Each adult high school offers both EdVance, a program specifically for 18 to 20-year-olds completing their high school diploma, and an Adult Program for learners who are 21 years and older.
- Adult high schools offer classes in quads starting in September, November, February, and April.
- ⇒ Tuition is free and classes are offered through different methods such as day school, night school, and online learning.

HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY: CAEC

- ⇒ The Canadian Adult Education Credential (CAEC) high school equivalency assessment replaced the GED in Canada. It is for adults who don't have a high school diploma and need to show high school level knowledge.
- The CAEC assessment consists of tests in five subject areas: reading, writing, social studies, math and science. If you write and pass these five tests, you will obtain your Ontario High School Equivalency Certificate.
- Many colleges, apprenticeship programs, and careers schools will accept the CAEC for entry into their programs.

To take the CAEC assessment in Ontario, you must:

- Not have your Ontario Secondary School Diploma.
- Not be currently registered with an Ontario public, Catholic, or private high school.
- Be 18 years of age or older.
- Have been a resident of Ontario for a minimum of six months.

If you previously passed the five GED® tests, your high school equivalency credential remains valid. If you completed some of the GED® tests, the CAEC will accept these subjects in place of the associated CAEC test subjects until May of 2027.

Some students choose to prepare for CAEC testing on their own. Students can review the test outcomes and complete practice tests online at www.ilc.org/caec. There are also CAEC preparation programs that will prepare students to write the assessment tests. A list can be found on the next few pages.

TVO ILC is the only organization authorized by the Ontario Ministry of Education to deliver the CAEC tests. You can register with them at www.ilc.org/caec. Tests are computer-based but must be written in-person at an ILC testing center. If you don't pass some of the tests, you will only need to re-take the subjects that you didn't pass. There is a registration fee of \$100 total, no matter how many of the tests you are writing.

HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY: ACE

- ⇒ The Academic and Career Entrance (ACE) program is a free high school equivalency program for adults.
- ⇒ Delivered in class by Ontario community colleges and online by the ACE Distance Program.
- Colleges in Ontario recognize the ACE certificate as a high school equivalent for admission.
- ⇒ Can be used to apply for college post-secondary programs and apprenticeship training programs.

In order to qualify for an ACE Certificate, students need to complete the following courses:

- Communications (English or French)
- One Mathematics course
- Any two other courses in line with student's learning goals

Courses usually offered in ACE programs include:

- Apprenticeship Math (Equivalent to MAP4C Grade 12 Foundations for College Math)
- Computers
- Core Math (Equivalent to MEL4E Grade 12 Mathematics for Work and Everyday Life)
- Physics (Equivalent to SPH3U– Grade 11 University Preparation Physics or SPH4C Grade 12 College Preparation Physics)
- Self Management/Self Direction
- Technology Math (Equivalent to MCT4C Grade 12 Math for College Technology)
- Biology (Equivalent to SBI3C Grade 11 College Preparation Biology)
- Business Math (Equivalent to MAP4C Grade 12 Foundations for College Math)
- Chemistry (Equivalent to SCH4C Grade 12 College Preparation Chemistry)
- Communications (Equivalent to ENG4C Grade 12 College English)

University preparation courses in Biology and Chemistry are also offered at select colleges for a fee. For more information, contact the college that offers this program.

HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY: ACE

Eligibility

You must be an Ontario resident who is at least 18 years old. This program might be a good fit for you if you want to prepare for college or get into an apprenticeship.

Requirements

You will need your own professional email address, access to the Internet, and a reliable computer. If you do not have a computer, there are 112 access sites in communities across Ontario where you can use computers at no charge. For more information about locations, go to www.studyonline.ca.

Step 1: Assessment

You must complete an assessment that will indicate your current skill level in several areas. This assessment is called ESEE - Essential Skills for Employment and Education. Each of the three ESEE Assessments (Reading, Document Use, and Numeracy) takes around 90 minutes to complete.

Step 2: Learn to Learn (L2L)

In order to participate in ACE Distance courses, all students must complete Learn to Learn, or L2L. Learn to Learn is a 20-hour course that will introduce you to online learning and help you to decide if this is the right learning approach for you. The Learn to Learn course includes an assessment component that helps you determine if you have the computer skills, academic background and personality to succeed in ACE Distance courses.

Step 3: Registration

After the completion of Learn to Learn, you will receive instructions about how to register for an ACE course. Tuition-free registration takes place in January, March, April, June, September, and November.



Courses are \$150 each plus the cost of reading material and span for 13 weeks, with classes being held once per week for three hours, typically in the evening.

SKILLED TRADES: PATHWAYS

Ontario has over 140 designated skilled trades, categorized into sectors like construction, industrial, motive power, and service. These skilled trades include autobody repair, baker, electrician, carpenter, hairstylist, heavy equipment operator, plumber, welder, and many more. You can find a full list at www.skilledtradesontario.ca/.

Some trades have a **Red Seal endorsement**, which shows that you have the knowledge and skills necessary to practice your trade across Canada. You need to pass the Red Seal examination in order to received this seal. There are currently 56 designated Red Seal trades. You can find the full list at www.red-seal.ca/eng/trades/trades-list.shtml

There are many benefits of getting into the skilled trades, including good wages, stable hours, and job benefits. There is also a high demand for skilled tradespeople, meaning it may be easier to get a job. See the below steps for how to enter into a skilled trade:

- 1. **Choose a trade.** Do your own research to identify the trade you are interested in. You can visit the website above or speak with individuals who are in the skilled trades.
- 2. (Optional) **Complete a pre-apprenticeship program.** This will support you in learning the preparatory skills needed for an apprenticeship. For more information on preapprenticeship programs, see page 48.
- 3. **Find an apprenticeship.** First, you must find an employer who is willing to sponsor you in an apprenticeship. Next, you must register your training agreement with Skilled Trades Ontario. You will then complete your apprenticeship requirements. Once you complete your apprenticeship, you will receive your Certificate of Apprenticeship. Find out more about apprenticeships on page 47.
- 4. **Complete the required certification for your trade.** In compulsory trades, such as electrician or plumber, a Certificate of Qualification is essential for legal work. In order to attain this, you need to pass an exam. If your trade is part of the Red Seal program, you must pass an examination to receive a Red Seal endorsement.
- 5. **Complete any ongoing requirements if necessary.** For example, in compulsory trades, you need to renew your Certificate of Qualification regularly.

- ⇒ An apprentice takes classes and learns a skilled trade by working under the direction of more experienced workers.
- ⇒ Apprentices are workers, so you will need to find an employer who will train you. This also means you get paid while you learn.
- ⇒ Apprenticeships take two to five years to complete.

Skilled Trades Ontario

Apprentices must be members of Skilled Trades Ontario, which is the agency responsible for apprenticeship and skilled trades certification in Ontario. Becoming an apprentice can be an important first step to learning new skills and building a rewarding career.

Some apprenticeships require you to take an exam once your training is complete. You can find more information <u>here</u>.

Apprentices become skilled workers once they have acquired the knowledge and skills in a trade or occupation and are certified by a provincial or territorial authority.

What is Pre-Apprenticeship?

A pre-apprenticeship is a preparatory program that supports individuals who want to begin an apprenticeship for certain industries and trades. Pre-apprenticeship programs equip workers with expertise and real life experience to help them find employment as an apprentice and, eventually, as a licensed professional.

People who enroll in a pre-apprenticeship program get a head start on succeeding as an apprentice because they learn prerequisite skills, gain an overview of daily expectations in their target professional field, and learn strategies for getting selected into formal apprenticeships.

Due to the focus on job readiness, pre-apprenticeship training includes extensive amounts of hands-on preparatory work to simulate real world application of skills and experience. When not working on projects and assignments, participants of pre-apprenticeship training also spend time in the classroom with licensed and certified instructors, learning from texts and code books.

Many community based organizations provide pre-apprenticeship programs. An online search for free pre-apprenticeship programs in Toronto will get you off to a great start. You can also find information on some pre-apprenticeship programs on the following pages.

- Offers one-year certificate programs in plumbing techniques, welding techniques, electrical techniques and construction techniques, some of which are eligible for a \$20,000 scholarship.
- Offers two-year diploma programs in heating, refrigeration, and air conditioning technician, and carpentry and renovation technician. These programs are eligible for a \$40,000 scholarship.

- Plumber Pre-Apprenticeship Program for Low-Income Women: 12-week, tuition-free program designed to support women experiencing financial difficulties to transition towards a Plumbing apprenticeship. You will receive the equivalent of Level 1 plumber apprentice training.
- General Carpentry Pre-Apprenticeship: 10-week, tuition-free program designed to introduce youth aged 18-35 who have completed grade 12 or equivalency to the skilled trade of Carpentry.
- Plumber Pre-Apprenticeship: 12-week, tuition-free program for youth 18-29 that is designed as a transition step to finding an apprenticeship. You will received the equivalent of Level 1 plumber apprentice training.
- Humber College also offers many paid pre-apprenticeship diploma and advanced diploma programs.

Financial aid programs are often changing, with new scholarships and bursaries available every day. Scholarship databases are continually updating their information. It is highly recommended to check resources often and research financial aid directly at the school or program you are applying to.

Schools - Financial aid programs are often available through schools. You could be eligible for bursaries, scholarships, work-study programs, or summer employment opportunities.

Emergency loans - Most schools offer emergency loans. You could be eligible for a short-term loan (ex. 90 days) to cover tuition while you wait for OSAP to arrive.

Eligibility criteria - Scholarships are often aimed at specific target groups, which can be based on income, geographic region, subject of study, crown ward status, or disability. Search criteria can be used to find scholarships or bursaries that may be applicable to you.

Types of Financial Aid - Quick Definitions

- Scholarships A financial prize that is to be used towards tuition payment; no repayment is required. Applicant criteria vary, but often include academic merit, extracurricular activities, and/or financial need. Application procedures are different for each scholarship. Some will request a copy of academic transcripts. Most academic institutions offer scholarships that you either need to apply for are automatically considered for (i.e., entrance scholarships).
- Entrance Scholarship Specific type of scholarship, often not requiring an application, that is based on academic performance from a previous school, most often high school. Similar to general scholarships, no repayment is required. Check out each academic institution for specific dollar amounts and requirements.
- Renewable vs. Non-Renewable Scholarships Renewable scholarships continue year after year, so long as minimum requirements are met as set out by each scholarship. Non-renewable scholarships are generally for one defined time period, i.e. one year.
- **Bursaries** A financial award for students with demonstrated financial need. Bursaries often have academic requirements, however more generally focus on students who do not have the financial resources to pay for school. Application procedures are different for each bursary; generally, you are required to show why you are in need of assistance and how great your need is.
- Loans Borrowing money with the requirement to pay back, often with interest. Common loans include government loans (OSAP) and bank loans (student loans). Loans are often paid back once education has been completed or stopped.
- Other Awards Includes all other financial prizes. This can include contest-type prizes or prizes from corporate/private sector. Tips: Always read the eligibility criteria for any scholarship, bursary, or award. Adhere strictly to deadlines and submit all required documents.

Ontario Student Assistance Plan (OSAP)

The Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) is a financial aid program that can help you pay for college or university. OSAP offers funding through two kinds of money: **grants** (money you don't have to pay back) and a **student loan** (money you need to repay once you're done school). When you apply for OSAP, you will be automatically considered for both grants and loans. If you don't want to take a loan, you can decline it after your application is approved.

Who is eligible to receive OSAP?

OSAP is open to Ontario citizens of any age who are Canadian citizens, permanent residents, or protected persons.

You may not be eligible for OSAP if you don't meet the academic progress requirement have enough financial resources to cover your expenses; report income on your OSAP application that is significantly different from what was reported to CRA; have defaulted on a student loan; have grant or bursary overpayments; filed for bankruptcy; made a consumer proposal; obtained a consolidation order; have reached your lifetime limit of student loan funding; are an international student; or are not a resident of Ontario.

What can OSAP be used towards?

OSAP can be used towards tuition, books and equipment, fees charged by your school, living expenses (for full-time students), and child care (for full-time and part-time students with children).

How much OSAP can I get?

The amount of money you can get depends on a number of different factors including:

- 1. **Education expenses:** Amount of money required to pay for education, including tuition, books, child care, living expenses, and other materials.
- 2. **Personal financial situation:** Personal and family contribution, based on personal and family income and other factors.
- 3. **Course load:** Full-time or part-time.

How to Apply for OSAP

- 1. **Register online for an OSAP account at <u>www.osap.gov.on.ca</u>**. You will need your Social Insurance Number to create your OSAP account. Be sure to write down your OSAP access number and password.
- 2. **Apply for OSAP through your account.** This typically takes less than 15 minutes. You will need information about your school and program, your parents' or spouse's SIN number (if applicable), your tax information, and your parents' or spouse's tax information (if applicable).
- 3. **Submit your OSAP application by the deadline.** For part-time students with study periods of 21 weeks or more and for all full-time students, submit your application no later than 60 days before the end of your study period. For part-time students with study periods of 20 weeks or less, submit your OSAP application no later than 40 days before the end of your study period. For micro-credential programs, submit your OSAP applications no later than the end of your study period.
- 4. Receive an estimate of how much OSAP funding you may be eligible for after submitting your application. You could qualify for more money if you are an Indigenous student, a student with a permanent disability, or a current or former Crown ward. See next page for more details.
- 5. Complete either a Full-Time or Part-Time Master Student Financial Assistance Agreement (MSFAA) if required. This is a lifetime student loan agreement, which only needs to be completed once for full-time or part-time studies. If you are enrolled in a microcredential program, you will complete a Micro-credential Student Loan Agreement instead. NSLSC will send you an email when it's time to complete your MSFAA online.
- 6. You may need to complete your signature and declaration forms and upload them to your OSAP account. You may also need to submit additional documents. For full-time and part-time students, your financial aid office must receive these documents no later than 40 days from the end of your study period. For micro-credential students, you must provide these documents no later than five days after your study period has ended.
- 7. Check your OSAP account regularly and opt-in for email notifications so that you know when updates occur. It typically takes about four to six weeks to hear back after submitting your application and documents.

OSAP for Under-Represented Learners

Indigenous Students

Funding may be available to you through various sources including your band and OSAP. Other funding programs include...

- The Indigenous Student Bursary: Available to full-time and part-time post-secondary students attending publicly-assisted colleges and universities in Ontario or an approved Indigenous Institute in Ontario. Bursary amounts range from \$1000-\$3500. Click here for more information.
- 2. **Ontario Indigenous Travel Grant:** Assists with the cost of travelling between your remote First Nations community and the postsecondary school that you attend. Click here for more information.

Individuals In or Formerly In Society Care (previously known as Crown Wards)

Individuals 23 to 26 years old who left the care of an Ontario Children's Aid Society and received Ready Set Go program financial support may be eligible for a Living and Learning Grant. This grant provides additional funds above the regular full-time OSAP aid limits. You are automatically considered for this grant when you submit an OSAP Application for Full-Time Students. Supporting documents may be required to confirm your eligibility.

Individuals 18 to 26 years old who are in or were formerly in the care of an Ontario Children's Aid Society and are not receiving Ready Set Go support may also be eligible for the Living and Learning Grant. Eligible individuals include those currently or formerly in extended society care in Ontario; subject to a customary care agreement in Ontario; subject to a protection custody order; or receiving support under a Voluntary Youth Services Agreement.

If you are currently or were formerly in extended society care in Ontario, you can get a refund for the fees you pay when you apply to an approved program at a college, university, or Indigenous Institution, and a first post-secondary degree, diploma, or certificate. OSAP for Under-Represented Learners

First-Generation Students

If your parents didn't attend post-secondary studies, you could be eligible for the Ontario First Generation Bursary for between \$1,000 and \$3,500. Each school will have an Ontario First Generation Bursary application which will outline any required supporting documents. For more information, click here.

Students with Disabilities

If you have a permanent disability or a persistent or prolonged disability, you could be eligible for full-time OSAP funding if you are taking 40% or more of a full course load. You must self-identify as having a disability when applying for OSAP to be considered.

You may also be eligible for the Bursary for Students with Disabilities and/or the Canada Student Grant for Services and Equipment - Students with Disabilities, which help eligible full-time and part-time students pay for disability-related services and equipment needed to participate in postsecondary students.

Students Who Are Deaf or Hard of Hearing

If you are Deaf, dead, deafened, or hard of hearing and want to study at a school where American Sign Language or Quebec Sign Language is the primary language of instruction, you could be eligible for a special bursary that can help you cover the extra cost of studying outside of Canada. For more information, click here.

Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP)

If you get income support through ODSP, you can also apply for OSAP. OSAP is meant to help cover specific educational costs. You can continue to get ODSP income support to help with living costs while receiving OSAP. Contact your caseworker for more information,

Ontario Works (OW)

If you receive financial assistance through OW, you need to apply for OSAP to help cover both your educational and living costs. For single, full-time students getting OSAP, you are not eligible for OW support. For married or a sole-support parent, you could be eligible for an OW top up if the amount of money you get from OSAP is less than you would get through the OW program. Contact your caseworker for more information.

Student Access Guarantee

If you attend a public post-secondary institution in Ontario and you're a full-time student, you may also be eligible for financial help through the Student Access Guarantee (SAG). SAG is a partnership program between the Ministry of Training, Colleges, and Universities and Ontario's public colleges and universities. Through SAG, Ontario's publicly assisted colleges and universities provide qualified students with additional financial aid so that financial need is not a barrier to accessing post-secondary education. Students are assessed for SAG when they apply for OSAP, and this money is then disbursed to your school account.

If OSAP doesn't cover your program costs and you still need money, your school may provide additional financial aid in the form of a bursary, scholarship, or work-study or summer-employment program.

Note that you are only eligible for SAG if you were approved for full-time OSAP and did not opt out of available OSAP loan funding (for example, deny OSAP loans and accept only grant funding).

Financial Supports for Apprenticeship Training

Government of Ontario Tools Grant

• The Tools Grant is a non-repayable cash grant available for Ontario apprentices to help pay for trade-related tools and equipment. You can receive up to \$1,000 for motive power trades, \$600 for construction or industrial trades, or \$400 for service trades. To qualify, you must have completed level one in-class training on or after April 1st, 2020, have a registered training agreement, and have been registered as an apprentice for at least 12 months.

Government of Ontario Apprentice Development Benefit

• The Apprentice Development Benefit provides financial assistance for apprentices who are attending class full-time and are registered as an apprentice with Skilled Trades Ontario. Eligible expenses can include basic living expenses, dependent care, and travel.

• The Apprenticeship Completion Bonus is a \$2,000 cash grant for those who have completed their training in a non-Red Seal trade. You must have received your Certificate of Apprenticeship and have been issued a Certificate of Apprenticeship or Certificate of Qualification no more than 180 days prior to the date you are applying. Skilled Trades Ontario will send you an application when you are eligible to apply.

Canada Apprentice Loan

• The Canada Apprentice Loan is an initiative of the Government of Canada to help individuals complete their apprenticeship in a designated Red Seal trade. You can get up to \$4,000 in interest-free loans per period of technical training to help pay for tuition, tools, equipment, and living expenses.

Additional Financial Supports

Banks - Banks often have scholarship opportunities specifically for students. These scholarships may have specific eligibility requirements, which could be dependent on post-secondary institution, identity, and/or income. It is recommended to check out each individual website to determine scholarship details. Some examples include:

- **TD Scholarships for Community Leadership:** For students in their final year of high school who have shown a commitment to making a positive difference in their community.
- **RBC Future Launch Scholarship:** For youth 15 to 29 years old enrolled part-time in school or not in school at all. Scholarships are flexible and can be used for any learning opportunity.
- Bank of Canada Scholarship Award for Post-Secondary Students: For students with disabilities or who are Indigenous, 2SLGBTQ+, Francophone, or who identify as a member of a visible minority or racialized group. Must be pursuing post-secondary studies in economic and finance, administration and operations, or information technology and cyber security.

Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP) - This is a long-term savings plan that assists in saving for a child's post-secondary education. Savings grow tax-deferred until they are withdrawn. When funds are withdrawn for education purposes, the money is taxed in the student's hand, typically at a lower rate.

Canadian Learning Bond (CLB) - CLB is a grant from the Canadian government that helps low -income families start saving early for their child's post-secondary education. The bond works by depositing money for each eligible child, born in 2004 or later, into a Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP). You don't need to invest anything to receive these deposits. In the first year, the CLB deposits \$500 per child initially and \$100 per child every year until each child turns 15, up to a maximum of \$2000. Employment and Social Development Canada will also pay \$25 into the RESP in recognition of a one-time incidental expense associated with opening the RESP account.
